

This was the second time we brought Canadian high school students to Panajachel to help Porch build houses. This has been a wonderful opportunity for us and our young people to learn, to grow, and to serve those in need.

I say this for all 37 in our group - students, parents and teacher chaperones alike:

* We learned to work as a team, hauling materials up to job sites, mixing cement on the ground, passing buckets of concrete, plastering walls, digging a pit for a septic tank.

*We learned by seeing how hard most Guatemalans work just to have the bare necessities for their families. *We saw how our efforts two years ago have helped to change the fortunes of Manuel's family by providing them with a simple house.

*We were touched by the gratitude of Eusebia's family

as we poured their roof, helping them to regain some hope in their life.

*We saw a ten year-old boy come each morning to help us haul sand and gravel before his afternoon shift at school, so that he could have a sandwich and some extra food for his family.

These are the experiences that transform our lives; by giving, we receive so much more. Thanks to everyone at Porch de Salomon for making this possible.

SPEECHLESS TEACHER

Meet Mayra. She is a 9 year-old indigenous girl who suffers from cerebral palsy and seizures. I don't know much about cerebral palsy, but I do know that Mayra recently stole my heart. Mayra can't do much. She can't talk, walk or play with kids normally. She can only sit or stand there making repetitive clutching motions with her hands and watch what is going on around her. However, there is good news. She has been receiving treatment and her family is receiving a new house, courtesy of Team Sharon Church and Porch de Salomon.

It was fun to watch the team kids and the indigenous kids play together at the job site. Mayra was standing off to the side, watching and smiling. I went over to her and tried to engage her, but she couldn't speak. My normal routine with kids is to "color" with them or blow bubbles, but she couldn't do these either. I wanted to give her attention, but felt awkward because I didn't know what to do. I finally took a chance, pulled up a chair and placed her in my lap where she could watch her house going up around her. She loved the attention. As we giggled at each other she clutched my hands and grinned so big that I thought her lips would split. We had so much fun together.

The longer I am here in Guatemala, the more I learn to break through my comfort barriers that hinder building relationships and serving. I make excuses to justify my not doing something because it might be awkward, or frankly, I don't want to do it or risk discomfort. However, I am finding that when I seize the moment and try to meet a need, I am usually profoundly rewarded by it. Sometimes, it's as simple as giving a smile or a hug.

Mayra taught me a good lesson; I will remember her smile and our giggles for many years to come.
