#### **STATUS REPORT!**

\* While Guatemala's borders remain closed, the government is now experimenting with a moderate, 15-day loosening of travel restrictions and curfews. \*There are 51,542 known Covid 19 cases in the entire country.

\* The pandemic caused cancelation of Porch de Salomon's remaining 25 teams. The direct financial impact/lost resources of our 2020 team cancelations exceeds \$200,000.
\* All Porch staff are receiving full pay, and benefits, and continue to work and serve.

\* Melanie and I remain unable, because of the pandemic, to make our customary promotion and fundraising visits.

Your continued generous donations are helping fill the financial void created by team cancellations and avoid a deficit caused by no in-person promotion. Your donations continue to help Porch de Salomon do things which have eternal value, things that will last. Gracias! *Lloyd*

### TRANSPORTATION THAT LASTS by Hilda

One of the Guatemalan government's first responses to the pandemic was to ban public transportation. Most Guatemalans depend on these buses and pick-ups; they don't own automobiles. Renal/kidney patients who needed to travel four hours to Guatemala City for their weekly kidney dialysis were put in danger.

Porch's Poncho (Alvaro) himself depends on dialysis, although he is able to do most of his at home in Panajachel. He worked to combine all the local patients' appointments to Mondays and Fridays. Poncho and our Jezer share the driving duty and disinfect our "Becky Bus" for each trip. Poncho feels that this was the purpose of all that he went through, and he feels honored and blessed to help more people suffering from kidney failure, and with his own experience be able to guide them.

Norma Elda Arreaga (56), her family, and her father are very grateful for this Porch project. She has tearfully told us that her father, Francisco Evelio Arreaga (80), owes his life to Porch de Salomon.

Porch has spent \$2000 (excluding salaries) on these trips since the pandemic struck in March. The trips will continue, we trust. <u>We invite you to donate</u> all or part of that cost; that can be your part of this lasting work! *Lloyd* 

## VOLUNTEER SPOTLIGHT: JAYNE MITTAN'S LASTING WORK

After being interested in global mission work for decades, the trip I finally took with my church to serve with Porch de Salomon in 2011 changed my life. I was "all in." Providing medical care to the indigenous people, as a physician's assistant, was so fulfilling! I was doing what God gave me the skills to do.

Then, my world was turned upside down in 2013. My husband of 32 years was killed in a car accident. There was no chance to say one more "I love you" or goodbye. All of our plans, hopes, and dreams were gone. I was in a very dark place for what seems like an eternity. Later, lying in bed, I heard the voice of God, as clearly as if he was standing in the room. He asked "Are you going to spend the rest of your life in misery, or are you going to get up and do what I created you to do?" As I received a wrongful death settlement, the light bulb went off; I retired after 20 years of practice as a nurse and 13 as a PA. (continued at right).
