That, in and of itself, invites a little chaos; folks --aged 7 to 75, from all walks of life, hoping to have one of the best weeks of their lives--are going to keep it interesting.

Melanie and recently enjoyed a movie entitled "A Little Chaos." The lead character is a 17th century female landscape designer whose slightly chaotic, but more interesting, garden designs allowed her to build some of the famous gardens at Versailles.

Part of Porch's ministry "DNA" is our willingness to allow Jesus to shine through a bit of disorder and unpredictability; we take chances and we take chances on folks. Jesus did both (e.g. overturning moneychangers' tables in the temple). As per our team guidelines: Sometimes it's complicated and even messy but we believe God often works best in "messes." Without oxen a stable stays clean, but you need a strong ox for a large harvest. Proverbs 14:4

This past month also included: the Dirty Feet Mission interns living in the Deeds' house, while the Deeds lived in our house (as they prepare to move back to Indiana), while Melanie and I moved into our uncompleted new house/ packed worship gatherings with folks sitting on the floor/head lice/a wedding/ a friend's voluntary admission to drug rehab/Linda falling through a footbridge/Melanie dislocating a finger in a separate fall/taking out a mortgage to help Noe buy a house for his family/the death of one of "our" SESAN malnourished children (May God rest Dilia's soul and grant her family peace), among other things.

Fear not--all is well. The work and outreach and testimony are going very well! <u>Thank you</u> for resourcing this year-round work (which continues when we have no teams) and for your partnership and prayers. *Gracias a Dios y Adelante*!

One example of the chaos of their lives is the oldest daughter's inability to attend school and possible PTSD.

In contrast, Vilma and her family's lives (which in many ways mirrored Antonia's family) will be more predictable and orderly since they moved into their new concrete block home last month (Porch's <u>seventh</u> for 2015!). We thank our teams and their supporters who funded and built this house.

Through generous donors, we are also helping them with milk for the twins, food for the family, school, and a sustainability plan. *Gracias a todos!*

I've never been welcomed into a home and extended "family" such as Porch de Salomon's. I now feel as if I have a family and a home of my own in Guatemala. Ofelia especially touched my heart; this little indigenous *nina*, and this trip, have become important stepping stones in my life. Here are three more of these "stones":

1. We all smile in the same language.

Guatemalans are generous with their ear-to-ear smiles, and I can feel God here. The people are simple, the gestures are simple. Their land, crops, and families are clearly important to them. I feel as if I can move mountains. We worked hard to help build

Ofelia's family house; digging a ten-foot septic tank, hand mixing concrete, moving cinder blocks, or carrying water. There were endless laughs... along with daily "blood, sweat, and tears" as our team strived to make a difference. We were told to make our own connections with the children and families. Team leader "Flower Nancy" said they would steal our heart. I can assure you my heart was stolen but I'm not ready to take it back. I am okay with this.

2. God is a home.

It's as simple as that; God is a home and we helped build homes. I am 20 years young and God is moving through Porch de Salomon in ways I can't account for.

3. Remember everything you saw.

I keep repeating this to myself. It was all so very real; dirt and tin, tarps and cardboard walls, a hole in the earth for a toilet, a *Wall Street Journal* being utilized as a mat, famished children, cornfields, volcanoes, beautiful smiles, toothless smiles, gold tooth smiles. *We all smile in the same language*!

Porch--*muchas gracias*. I will never be able to repay you for what you have done for me and our team. God Bless.
