## FINISHING WITH FAITH. HOPE. AND LOVE

2014 has been an eventful and high-impact year for Porch de Salomon. We are thankful for the support of our mission partners (churches and individuals) who provide the money that funds our year-round humanitarian relief and outreach in Guatemala. While, frankly, our bank balance has shrunk, as our work expands under Noe's leadership, we have faith that God will provide the resources necessary through his people (like you!) at year's end. Here are three stories, among our many, of faith, hope, and love!

FAITH: Albino supported himself and his mother selling snacks on public buses at a busy nighway intersection in Los Encuentros. That ended when he was run over by two cars; he was not expected to live but, after eight operations and seven months of hospitalization, he survived. He testifies, in his Kaq'chikel language, that he never gave up his faith in God or for help for his family. Now, he and his mother will receive our final building project of 2014--a decent kitchen and bathroom (wheelchair accessible).

HOPE: In Jackelin Elizabeth Cumes' (12, below left) own words: I am in the sixth grade in Panajachel; it is my <u>hope</u> and dream to some day be a teacher who can help children. My parents have been in prison for drug trafficking since I was three years old. I live with relatives but they do not have enough money to pay for my schooling. I am thankful for a Porch de Salomon "Beca" scholarship which now provides for my schooling. May God bless and help those who are helping me.

While Kenia's recent corrective surgery was a success, she will need at least two more operations.

# Please provide NEW SCHOOL SCHOLARSHIPS FOR 2015

In Guatemala, over 50% of indigenous teenagers have not completed third grade. On average, indigenous Guatemalans have only 3.5 years of school. Grinding poverty is the predominate cause of this problem; families simply cannot afford school as they struggle to put food on the table each day. For example, Jackelin (see page one) will not be able to attend school next year without our help.

Flora (9, *top right*) has suffered the death of her mother (alcohol poisoning) and an unsettled life due to her father's alcoholism. Now in the custody of her aunt (in a Porch project house!), Flora and her indigenous sisters are "behind" in school but are making progress through the help of Porch scholarships.

Alfonso (12, *lower right)* and his indigenous single-mother family (his father died six years ago from alcohol addiction) are hard-working people who live in Chipop. Porch scholarships have allowed him to make it to sixth grade---farther than anyone else in his family.

Each year since 2006, Porch de Salomon has provided school scholarships ("Becas") through the generosity of our Beca donors. In 2014, our donors funded over 70 scholarships! We are now inviting and accepting donations for the 2015 school year (which runs from January to October)!
