GOOD NEWS, POOR, BLIND: YEAR OF FAVOR

I've had the privilege of preparing Porch's first annual *PorchTalk* newsletter 14 times now. Many of these included humble indigenous families, in dire straits. I have never been more humbled and pleased to share a family's story than that of Florencio and Juana's family. <u>Three</u> of this Panyebar indigenous family's children are blind, afflicted with retinitis pigmentosa.





The father, Florencio, earns \$160 monthly as a farm hand and selling toys and candy in the street when there is no farm work. Juana is a dedicated homemaker and attends to Evelio (17), Ana Maria (13), and Juana's (11) special needs and medical appointments. The family lives with Florencio's mother in her make-do house; boards, blocks, tin roofing, tin kitchen, and outhouse. The blind children bear scars

from falls or cuts suffered in or around the house.

Rosa courageously fled her indigenous village, about two years ago, to escape an alcoholic, abusive husband and seek a better life for her children.

As she said, we believed in her when few did. Porch is funding a micro-business for her.



Update on 2019 BECA SCHOOL SCHOLARSHIPS

In Guatemala, over 50% of indigenous teenagers have not completed third grade. Indigenous Guatemalan women average only 3.5 years of school. Grinding poverty is the predominant cause of this problem; families simply cannot afford school as they struggle to put food on the table each day.

Each year since 2006, Porch de Salomon has provided school scholarships through the generosity of our *beca*

donors. In 2019, we aim to fund 165 scholarships! *(Above left)* We are proud of our 2018 high school graduates.
