

BUILDING HAS STARTED, and faith become sight, on Juana Quisquina's new family house in *Vasconcelos, Xajaxac*. The family's dirt-floor, adobe house is hot in the dry season and cold in the rainy season. The decrepit "tin" (lamina) roof leaks. Their sanitation facilities are abysmal. Juana separated from her husband when he insisted on bringing a second wife into their home.

Through a 2017 Porch de Salomon micro-business (chicken/egg) grant, Juana and her son Joel achieved increased income, sufficient for food and some basic needs. They tended to the business well and Porch is helping them expand with a second sustainability grant.

MEET HILDA MUX SON

I'm the youngest of five children in my indigenous family from San Juan Comalapa, Guatemala. Our family, even with our financial struggles, valued education and the ability to speak English as ways to improve our future. There are few good job opportunities in our town, but I worked where I could, part-time, and started college. When my brother became very sick, I took out a loan to help with his medical expenses. I had to quit college.

In desperation, and in faith, I moved to Panajachel (with my friend Eugenia's family's help) and worked as a translator for a bit. I learned of Porch de Salomon, approached them, and eventually became their English teacher. Their partner ministry, Dirty Feet Missions, gave me free housing, I received a college scholarship, and Porch paid off my debt. Wow!

Porch gave me the opportunity to prove myself and, late last year, <u>I was promoted to Humanitarian Relief Co-director</u>. It is a blessing to work with people who, in faith, give poor or discouraged people hope. God's mercy has been wonderful in my life— when I

came to Panajachel, I was poor and discouraged also. Thank you, Porch de Salomon, and all who support this ministry.
