Hilda writes: Estela Zaput *(at right, far left)* is the oldest of four children. Her parents are farm workers. It's been hard for them to find work and provide for their family.

Estela and her little sisters used to make bead bracelets and come to Panajachel to sell them and earn a little money, but now that there's no tourism, they can't sell. This makes it hard for the entire family. They are very thankful for the help Porch de Salomon provides their family.

Esvin is 15 months old; social workers referred him to Porch for acute infant malnutrition. His father is a baker who earns only \$16 weekly. This is insufficient to adequately feed the family of five.

We will provide Esvin with milk and supplement for \$35 per month. We would also like to provide his family with eggs, beans, and oil for \$60 per month.



DOING GOOD FOR ANALY

Analy (13, *below seated*) lived in the village of Palestina; her grandmother was her primary caregiver and her father was a poor farmer. Ana suffered from a severe intestinal problem. Through our social worker, Eugenia, Porch became involved providing colostomy bags and Ensure. Eugenia organized a birthday party for her with a cake, a piñata, and gifts to cheer Analy up.

Sadly, Analy died recently from organ failure. Porch provided her casket; we will also furnish a nice *lapida* (like a tombstone) for her crypt.

Analy's situation and death really impacted me. I have a brother who uses colostomy bags. Please pray for Analy's little soul. *Hilda Mux Son*

Angelica sold seedlings in the Panajachel market; her husband Jose sold street-cart tacos. The pandemic ended both their humble incomes.

Their family of seven includes two profoundly deaf daughters. All live in one room with no sanitation/toilet facilities. Standing water (shown below) is a Dengue fever risk.

Porch will build them a simple, small concrete block house for \$4500. It's <u>already funded, God be praised</u>. See left for details.



Maria (41) left her village and became a rare female "street alcoholic" in Solola; she sometimes passed out in a traffic lane. Following a social worker referral, Porch placed her in our partner rehabilitation ministry Casa Ixoq'i at our expense. She looked great three weeks into recovery!

Maria had abandoned her daughters Maria (7) and Ashilin (10) to her 89-year mother's care. Porch is pleased to provide them with nutritious food each month. Please pray for all involved! (Below) Cristian is nine months old. He was diagnosed with acute infant malnutrition. His hair color also indicates that; it should be jet black.

The pandemic cost his 23-year-old single mother her \$50 monthly salary selling fried chicken. Porch will furnish Cristian with milk, vitamins, and more.
